Waimakariri, Reaccredited 27th June, 2013, Population 50,000

Waimakariri has retained 'International Safe Community' status for over 16 years, and was the second NZ Council to achieve this. Reviewers found that "Effective collaboration at local levels has encouraged a continuous-improvement approach, in the development of a positive safety culture and the creation of safer environments". Before cutting a rainbow cake that represented the Spectrum of Prevention – an internationally recognised 'best practice' model, the Mayor "thanked all partners for their contribution towards making the Waimakariri a Safer, Happier, Healthier District".

Waitaki District, Accredited 19th March, 2013, Population 20,200



Safer Waitaki was initiated as a way to identify the key community safety priorities for the Waitaki district. Safer Waitaki co-chair Paul Olsen said "when everyone came together, they became much more powerful". The vision is to improve and maintain safety in the community and the Waitaki district.

Efforts to date include, the Alliance Group Pukeuri Plant achieving, a 30% reduction in incidents and a 47% decrease in major workplace accidents. Coordinator Helen Algar stated "while it was exciting to be at this stage, it's very sobering too. It's a large responsibility for all of us but I'm looking forward to the challenge".

Safety Week 2013: just fine!

This year's Safety Week is a bit different. ACC plans to raise awareness of the impact of injuries related to sport and recreation, while drinking alcohol and when using steps and stairs. World Injury Prevention and Safety Promotion Conference, Atlanta, Georgia, USA 19-23 October 2014.








Overview of Safe Communities in New Zealand

A Safe Community is a place that is attractive to live, work and visit. A Safe Community is a liveable community, where people can go about their daily activities in an environment without fear, risk of harm, assault or injury. Perceptions of community safety, real or perceived, impact on the way people feel and interact in their community. Community safety is not only about reducing and preventing injury and crime. It is about building strong, cohesive, vibrant participatory communities.





Since 2005, there has been significant growth in both the number of accredited Safe Communities and the number of New Zealanders living in them. Currently, 24 communities have been accredited: Waitakere (1999,2006) now Safer West (2013); Waimakariri (1999,2006,2013); New Plymouth (2005,2010); Whangarei (2005,2011); Wellington (2006,2012); North Shore (2008); Tauranga (2008); Porirua (2008); Christchurch (2008); Wairarapa (Masterton, Carterton and South Wairarapa) (2010); Taupo (2010); Rotorua (2010); Hutt Valley (Lower Hutt and Upper Hutt) (2010); Napier (2010); Whanganui (2010); Nelson/Tasman (2011); Tairawhiti (2012); Central Hawkes Bay (2012); Hastings (2013) and Waitaki (2013).

In 2005, the Safe Communities Foundation New Zealand (SCFNZ) became the first organisation globally to receive designation as a certifying centre, providing it with the ability to perform assessments, certifications and ongoing capacity building. As the NZ arm of the WHO Collaborating Centre on Community Safety Promotion, SCFNZ encourages and supports those communities aspiring to be accredited Safe Communities. Learn more online.

Results Based Accountability (RBA)

RBA is ultimately about two questions: Accountability: "How do we improve the lives of the people" in our community?" and Performance Accountability: "How Alcohol Consumption | do we improve the performance of our programmes?"



As highlighted at the national forum, in NZ, overall rates of crime, injury and road fatalities are declining with levels of alcohol consumption decreasing. There have been no changes in ACC entitlement claim and injury hospitalisation rates.
