SCFNZ National Forum 2017

The Safe Communities Foundation NZ (SCFNZ) National Forum was held in Wellington on 24th and 25th July 2017. It was attended by 43 community participants, covering 32 territorial authorities in New Zealand and 2 Safe Communities (SCs) in Australia, three facilitators, and Jonathon Passmore (Technical Lead, Violence & Injury Prevention, Western Pacific Region), a World Health Organization (WHO) official. A further 15 speakers from Government agencies and non-government organisations attended part of the forum.

Jonathon Passmore's 2 presentations included the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and how these translate into the Regional Action Plan for Injury and Violence Prevention in the Western Pacific 2016-2020, in addition to the role and recommendations of WHO for the SC approach. Other presentations included SC key updates from the previous year, iwi-led crime prevention and community safety, philanthropic funding in Aotearoa, SDGs and the Ministry of Health priority areas related to violence & injury prevention, effective communication, key updates from the Pan Pacific Safe Communities Network, updates from the ACC portfolios of violence prevention and falls prevention, community & alcohol needs analysis, Family Harm Initiative (NZ Police), and the Health Promotion Agency 5-year alcohol plan.

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In addition, there were community sharing sessions, highlighting different aspects Safe Community model in action and opportunities for networking and discussion throughout the forum.

Early evaluation demonstrates the value of this annual forum with overall findings suggesting there was a high level of satisfaction with the forum. All ratings were positive, with most respondents (86%) rating their satisfaction as `excellent' or `very good'. In addition, all respondents said they had learnt something new relevant to their Safe Community work.

Safer Napier Show Case

Safer Napier hosted Jonathon Passmore (WHO) and SCFNZ staff for a day in late July to demonstrate how Napier applies the principles of the Safe Communities model to reduce injuries and violence at the local level.

The day started with a welcome at Pukemokimoki marae followed by presentations, including the `Safe as Houses' and `Family Violence Bystander' campaigns. There were discussions with Safer Napier members, such as Napier Community patrol and NZ Police, and the day concluded with an afternoon tea meeting hosted by Councillor Kirsten Wise.





"Safer Napier is a tremendous example of all sectors of society partnering to achieve common objectives of a healthy and safe community. Local leadership of evidence based and data driven approaches remain key to saving lives and preventing injuries in Napier," said Mr Passmore. Family Violence Prevention a Focus in Waitaki

Family violence prevention is part of the Safe Communities role in Waitaki, North Otago.

Safer Waitaki Community Safety and Development Facilitator Helen Algar (pictured) is passionate about preventing family violence and has led activities in Waitaki over the last five years as part of her Council role.

"Community safety is about a whole lot of things that happen

in a community where we live, work and play. We use a broader definition here, including what happens inside homes."

The decision to include family violence prevention activities in Helen's role came from a community survey five years ago where local people and organisations identified issues in the community. Road safety had previously been the primary focus.

Survey results showed a high level of concern about violence:

- 22% (extremely high), 38% (high)
- 19% (moderate), 8% (low).

"We looked at Police statistics and it became clear that they were quite high at a local level. We picked it up from there."

"If you can make a difference in terms of family violence, you are changing the culture of the community." Activities have included community debates, White Ribbon events and partnering with the national It's not OK campaign to design and deliver a local campaign.
